Call to Order: Scott Radach called the meeting to order at 12:04 p.m.

Reports: Lann Harlan, FPC Safety Center Director, said new training programs are starting

up. Agrium representatives met with FPC representatives resulting in good feedback and conversation about how FPC can be of benefit to Agrium. G2X wants to begin a site-specific BLP program through FPC. Other companies are

requesting equipment training.

The FPC Safety Center is preparing for upcoming turn-arounds. New-hire

scaffolding training is scheduled. All updates are in place.

Mr. Harlan recently underwent crane training through National Commission for the Certification of Crane Operators (NCCCO) and is now certified. Further processes and procedures are required; however, FPC will be a crane-training

site in the near future.

Dr. Byron Housewright, FPC Director of Agriculture Sciences, said FPC student, Bailey Eden, won second highest individual in swine competition at the National

Western in Denver, a premier swine contest in the United States.

The FPC Livestock Genetics Center open house is scheduled for February 9,

2017. Tours will be conducted.

Collier Diamond C Ranch in Stephenville, Texas, is interested in working with the

Livestock Genetics Center, utilizing the Center as a genetics distributor.

The FPC Swine Management program has tied in with JBS United in Dalhart, Texas, for dual-credit programs. JBS will help train students and will hire them

upon graduation.

The City of Borger created Resolution R-016-16 declaring the City's willingness to accept and hereinafter maintain those portions of Carbon Road located within the corporate limits of the City of Borger. Hutchinson County is also willing to accept and hereinafter maintain those portions of Carbon Road located outside of the corporate limits of the City of Borger, but within the County. The landowners along the entire length of Carbon Road, without any monetary compensation, are willing to dedicate the Road to public use to the City or County as may be appropriate.

Financial Report For Month Ending December 2016:

Year-to-date revenues include State Appropriations totaling \$1,053,556; Tuition and Fees totaling \$1,650,365; Taxes Collected totaling \$1,866,665; Donations and Gifts totaling \$13,812; and Grants and Contracts totaling \$929,668. Total revenue YTD is \$5,902,577.

Year-to-date expenditures include Repair and Maintenance totaling \$151,419 and Capital Expenditures totaling \$126,085 which include welding upgrades. Total expenditures YTD is \$4,559,324. Total increase in funds as of December 2016 is \$1,343,253.

On a motion by Marlene McKinney, seconded by Andy Green, the Board unanimously approved the contract with Dallam County.

Hartley County Contract:

The Dallam/Hartley Bi-County Branch Campus Maintenance Tax proposal passed in Hartley County. In accordance with procedure, Administration recommended that the FPC Board of Regents enter into the agreement with Hartley County for property tax collection services and property tax assessment services beginning in 2017. On a motion by Ryan Birge, seconded by Marlene McKinney, the Board unanimously approved the contract with Hartley County.

Approval to Sign Letter of Intent To Dedicate Carbon Road and Gregg Road:

On a motion by Pete Stynes, seconded by Marlene McKinney, the Board unanimously approved the signing of the Letter of Intent to Dedicate Carbon Road and Gregg Road contingent upon all three landowners signing Letters of Intent to dedicate their portions of the road for public use and upon the City's agreement to accept the college-owned section of Gregg Road.

Rescind Closure
Of Carbon Road:

On a motion by Ryan Birge, seconded by Pete Stynes, the Board unanimously approved the rescission of its former approval to close the gates on Carbon Road and thus allow public access to Carbon Road.

President's Report:

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) will meet Thursday, January 26, 2017, to approve the establishment of the branch campus in Dalhart.

The Borger Community Activity Center is still working to keep its head above water. The new Crossfit Program is expanding. FPC is looking at the possibility of adding corporate wellness.

FPC, Clarendon College, and Amarillo College are in the last year of the Panhandle Community College (PC3) agreement. FPC wants to partner with the two colleges again.

Vice-President's

Report:

GED and ESL classes are in progress.

FPC is working with the John N. Gardner Institute on the Retention Performance Management (RPM) program which is designed to improve retention rates for first year students, sophomores, first-generation students, and low-income students, among others. The program begins in November 2017 and was kicked off at the Spring 2017 FPC In-Service.

Amber Jones, Dean of Allen Campus – Perryton, and Dr. Carroll attended the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) meeting in Atlanta. SACS is pleased with the progress made by FPC. Dr. Hicks expressed appreciation to Dr. Carroll and all who worked to make progress in this area.

FPC will pursue seeking approval to offer more distance-learning classes at 50% off tuition and fees.

Two new English faculty have been hired.

Allen Campus

The trip to SACS in Atlanta was a good experience. Training and information were excellent.

Allen Campus classes are looking good. Mrs. Jones is teaching Economics.

The new distance-learning equipment is a good addition. GED and ESL classes are progressing nicely.
